

FROM OUR RABBI

Beth Shalom at 50 Years

This year Beth Shalom will be celebrating its 50th anniversary since our shul's founding back in 1975. The world has changed quite a bit since those days, but the connections we have to our synagogue and our community have remained as strong as ever.

So what is that special something that keeps us connected to our shul, our community and for that matter, our Jewish heritage?

According to legend, the great Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis in his senior year of law school was invited to join the exclusive Honor Society. "On the evening of the official induction, the atmosphere was thick. All eyes were on him as he walked to the lectern. Slowly, he looked around the room, as he said: "I'm sorry I was born a Jew,". The room erupted in applause. They thought that had finally prevailed in their efforts to convince him to convert to Christianity. Brandeis waited. When silence was regained, he began again. "I am sorry I was born a Jew, but only because I wish I had the privilege of choosing Judaism on my own." This time there was no shouting, no cheers; this time there was respectful silence. The members of the society were awed by his conviction and strength of character. And when he finished, they gave him a standing ovation.

"I am sorry I was born a Jew, but only because I wish I had the privilege of choosing Judaism on my own." Whether we are born Jewish or have converted to Judaism, each of us is a Jew-by-Choice today. Our grandparents could not have imagined not being part of a shul community.

At our Passover seder we will read in our Haggadah that "... in every generation someone rises up against us to try and destroy us...". Well, the fact that there are some people in this world who continue to hate us is painfully self-evident. But ultimately, that's not what is important. The important thing is that we love who we are, our history, our values and one another. If we can't love our own community nobody else will, or perhaps even should.

Today each one of us is a synagogue member-bychoice. In this world where missionaries target us for conversion, where anti-Semitism is growing, where Israel-bashing is an exploding phenomenon, and where the draws of assimilation often prove irresistible – we know that being Jewish and being part of a synagogue is a deliberate choice.

So again, we need to ask ourselves why do WE personally choose Judaism? Why do we choose to be connected to a synagogue or to the Jewish people?

If we go on a short journey through recent Jewish history with the values of Jewish life as our guide, we won't get



very far before realizing how our amazing tradition gives definition to our struggles, adds meaning to our experiences, and helps to make sense of our world. And the synagogue is that institution that brings us together to live a Jewish life, explore our teachings, and even debate our perspectives of what it means to be a part of the Jewish world today.

Rabbi David Wolpe in his book "Why be Jewish?" asserts that it is our great gift that God asks of us to maintain a posture of what he refers to as, "moral mindfulness." We are called upon to be present in the moment and to be always aware of the moral dimensions of our actions. We are also called upon to maintain a "spiritual mindfulness, an awareness of the presence of God behind all beings and things in the world." This "moral and spiritual mindfulness" is what keeps us connected to God, our history, freedom, humility and to the high ideals that Judaism demands of us.

So why should we remain Jewish? Because the Jewish experience calls upon us through our rituals, our traditions, and our teachings to live with high ideals for ourselves, and to strive to choose that which is good for our own betterment and that of our larger community. By looking inward to our tradition and practices we discover how we can become better human beings ourselves, and then work to translate that vision to *tikkun olam* as we strive to repair our fractured world.

In our age where we are greeted by a growing number of unprecedented choices, we cannot afford to take our wonderful Jewish community for granted, or the precious legacy that has been passed down to all of us. The same thing must be said for the special bonds of warmth and friendship that we have shared with each other in our congregation over these past 50 years.

Beth Shalom is indeed a very special place. And so let us work together to ensure that our synagogue remains a strong and vibrant community for the next 50 years!

FROM OUR ASSISTANT RABBI

Toward the beginning of the Passover seder is the easily overlooked *yachatz* section—the breaking of the middle matzah. This ordinary gesture has great symbolic weight. As subtle as it is, *yachatz* is a critical moment when we embody both brokenness and wholeness, oppression and freedom. To me, this is the essence of the Passover seder.

As a refresher, during the *yachatz* portion, the leader takes the middle matzah and breaks it into two pieces. One piece stays on the table with the maror and charoset. The other piece becomes the *afikomen*, which is traditionally the last piece of food that we eat at the end of the seder.

Within the Torah, matzah is associated with both freedom and brokenness. In one verse, the Torah reads: "You shall observe the [Feast of] Unleavened Bread, because on this day I brought your ranks out of the land of Egypt" (Exod. 12:17). Put another way, we eat matzah on Passover as a way of acknowledging gratitude for our freedom. Later on in the Torah, matzah is given another name: *lechem oni*—the bread of distress. Conversely to matzah as the bread of freedom, we also eat matzah as a reminder that our ancestors had to leave Egypt quickly (Deut. 12:3).

I see a striking parallel between breaking the middle *matzah* in two during *yachatz* at the seder and another important symbol of the Exodus: the two tablets containing the Ten Commandments.

As the narrative in the Torah goes, God wrote the commandments on stone tablets and gave them to Moses. When Moses witnessed the people worshiping the golden calf, he became incensed and smashed the tablets to the ground. Moses then returned to God, who dictated the commandments to Moses while he carved a new set of tablets. According to our tradition, the golden Ark, which the Israelites carried throughout the wilderness, contained both the broken fragments from the first tablets, as well as the second whole set enabled by God's forgiveness.



Thinking about the broken matzah like the stone tablets, the *yachatz* section becomes a physical representation of our learning. The ark containing both the broken and the mended tablets is an important symbol of our relationship with God. It suggests that the broken parts of ourselves that we bring in our relationship with God are every bit as important as the parts of our lives that feel whole. So, too, is the case with eating matzah as we bring together the painful distress of subjugation with the joy of liberation.

Later in the seder, the leader says *ha-motzi* to bless the matzah leading up to the meal. Upon blessing the matzah, it is common practice at the seder table for the leader to hold both the broken half of the middle matzah and the whole pieces together. What a beautiful symbol it is to bless God's name while simultaneously lifting up the brokenness and the wholeness together! It is a powerful reminder that God is present with us in both our shortcomings and our triumphs, yet it is up to us to bring God's presence into consciousness.

This year at the seder table as we break the middle matzah during *yahatz* and then consume both the fragmented and the whole parts, may we remember that God is with us and cares about us throughout all of our brokenness and our joy.

Really, my main concern is getting to my Passover dishes, pots, and pans. All are currently neatly stacked in their tubs, but blocked in my garage behind layers of things we've brought home from our storage unit (OK Jodi, I'll start getting rid of stuff) and my daughter's things (anyone want a roommate?). Yes, we have lost our "empty nester" status, again.

All kidding aside, Pesach really is my favorite holiday. Even with all the work, it brings me back to my childhood. Sometime soon we'll start our deep spring cleaning in preparation for the holiday. Then, I'll start making and freezing our big batches of chicken soup and sweet and sour meatballs. That starts the special smells of the holiday. Sunday, we'll be very busy doing the final touches of switching over the house to Peach food and dishes. Sunday night I'll make more or our favorite dishes for the yom tovim (chopped liver, charoset, matzoh apple cake, hard boiled eggs etc, etc) and at some point will break to do our search for Chametz. Monday I'll make our turkey, burn our chametz, set the table, and start warming everything up for our first seder. Whew, I just got hungry and tired all at the same time. We'll have our seder Monday night and retell/study the story of the Exodus, sing, laugh, get slap happy, throw plastic plague figurines at each other, and end way-too-late.

We'll finish cleaning up by around 1am, sleep for a few hours and then head to shul by 9:30 (ok, maybe 10) in the morning. As the saying goes, "wash, rinse, dry, and repeat"...



Tuesday-Wednesday morning will look a lot like Monday-Tuesday in my house. We'll rest Tuesday after shul. That is the start of our Pesach and I can't wait.

So, what is your favorite Pesach memory? I'd love to know.

I have three or four from my childhood that stand out. At my parents sedarim, Dad would invite everyone to take part in the readings. This included chanting the paragraphs to our special Pesach niggun (melody) in Hebrew...each of us (me and my brothers) vying for the longest paragraphs. The same thing with songs like Echad Mi Yodea (in Hebrew and/or Yiddish), Ki Lo Naeh, and Chag Gadya. We'd each have turns soloing. I can still hear the echos of this in my head. It was tremendous fun. Another memory is of seeing my mother's content exhaustion whenever she stopped to sit down with us at the table. She kvelled (and still does) over her family. She loved hearing her boys and her husband singing and seeing us enjoy everything that she prepared. While most of the preparation for the holiday and the smells of Pesach were my mother's Pesach, leading the Seder and getting us up in the morning for shul was my father's Pesach. The final memory that I will share with you was when we as kids would get too silly and slap happy at the seder table. My father had a great sense of humor and would play along with us until he had enough. He would smile and laugh enjoying his kids silliness. At some point however, when he had enough and was ready to continue the seder, he'd give us a firm "Nu!" and if we were not listening a firmer "Nu!" and slap his hand on the table. That would snap us all out of it. I do miss those days at my parents sedarim.

I love the whole holiday, including everything from unpacking to repacking and everything in between. I try to recreate the sedarim of my youth every year. It is a lot of work, but worth it. I hope this leaves the same lasting impression on my family and friends as it has on me. That is the Pesach that I look forward to.

As you know, it is forbidden to either consume or be in possession of any *hametz* (leavening) during the Passover Holiday. Traditionally, we sell any *hametz* that cannot be disposed of through the agency of the Rabbi. For your convenience, the following contract for the sale of *hametz* may be executed and mailed. You can also go online to make this transaction at <u>http://tinyurl.com/24hametz.</u>

It is also customary, though not required, to make a small contribution at the time of sale. Proceeds collected from the sale of *hametz* will go towards MA'OT CHITIM – Passover assistance for needy Jewish families.

POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR SALE OF HAMETZ

I, the undersigned, hereby empower and authorize Rabbi Mark Zimmerman to act in my behalf to sell, relinquish ownership or give as a gift, all *hametz* which is in my possession, whether knowingly or unknowingly, at present, or which may come into my possession up to the **14th day of Nisan in the year 5784, corresponding to April 22, 2024** until such hour that *hametz* is permitted to be sold: i.e. *hametz*, doubtful *hametz*.

and all types of *hametz* mixtures, as well as all flour, cereals, alcoholic drinks, utensils, and all *hametz* imbedded in them, whether inside or outside my house, and all other places of mine, whether owned or rented, where *hametz* may be found, irrespective of whether the *hametz* belongs to me or is in my possession or responsibility.



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



Join us for an most interesting discussion with Seth Stern, author of "**Speaking Yiddish to Chickens**" about the many Eastern European immigrants who came to America and ended up on a farm. Seth will be speaking to us via zoom. Most of the roughly 140,000 Holocaust survivors who came to the United States in the first decade after World War II settled in big cities such as New York. But a few thousand chose an alternative way of life on American farms. 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
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
